EXAMPLE

Study Abroad, CEA Barcelona, Spain (Jan. 2017 - June 2017) Applicable coursework: International Business & Intermediate Spanish Language

- Demonstrated willingness to take risks through enrollment in Spanish curriculum and living with host family

Interviewing

Using the STAR Technique

To give a great interview, prepare for it the way you would prepare for a test or a presentation: educate yourself, have a plan, and practice. The STAR technique helps you structure your interview answers to convey the information employers want most. If you practice using STAR to answer different hypothetical questions prior to your interview, you're sure to leave an excellent impression!

STAR works best for answering questions that begin with "Tell me about a time when...." or "Share an example of a project you completed...."

- **Be specific** with every story you tell to answer interview questions. Use people's names and quantify your success with numbers when possible.
- **Be concise,** communicating all of the important details about your achievement in the minimum amount of time.
- Be the intern your host organization needs. Tie your STAR example back to the position you're applying for, showing the interviewer how you can help the company.

Using the STAR technique, create a bank of stories you can tap into to answer interview questions, making sure your stories demonstrate you possess the skills the organization desires.

HOW IT WORKS

SITUATION – Set up your story with the problem you faced.

TASK – Explain what you were responsible for in the situation.

ACTIVITY – What did you do in response to the problem?

RESULT – Describe the problem's resolution, with an emphasis on what you personally achieved or learned.



EXAMPLE INTERVIEW QUESTIONS

- > Tell me about a time when you showed initiative
- Give me an example of a time when you dealt with a stressful situation
- Tell me about a time that you had to organize and plan for a major project
- When was a time you showed flexibility?

- Tell me about a time when you worked with a difficult person
- Why do you want this job?
- What was your time abroad like?
- What can you bring to this position?
- How are your language skills?
