MANUEL ANTONIO NATIONAL PARK (3 DAYS - \$295)


Afternoon departure by bus to Manuel Antonio National Park, home to some of the most beautiful beaches on the Central Pacific coast. Once you have checked into the hotel, head out for dinner with your fellow students and enjoy live music and Latin dancing.

After breakfast at the hotel, go on a hike to the national park where you'll be able to sink your feet into white sandy beaches, swim in the warm waters and get to know the flora and fauna of the park including monkeys, sloths, raccoons and many species of exotic plants and flowers.

On day three, enjoy free time at the beach or the hotel pool after breakfast then in the afternoon head back to San José.

Fee includes accommodation, transportation, entrance fees, breakfast and a welcome dinner on the first night. A minimum enrollment of 10 students is required for the optional excursion to run.

Veritas University was founded in 1975 as a college of the Universidad Autónoma de Centroamérica, the first private university in Costa Rica. In 1991, Veritas University became an independent university and has since grown to become one of the most highly regarded private universities in the Latin American academic community. Veritas is fully accredited by the Costa Rican Ministry of Education. It has an urban campus, equipped with modern facilities including computer labs, a well-maintained library and a cafeteria. Free Wi-Fi access is available.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Choose either of the health care courses listed, both of which are taught in English. A minimum enrollment of 5 students is required for a course to run.

Field trips Both courses will include field trips to medical and community health facilities. These may include visits to local organizations such as a doctor's clinic, an HIV clinic, an alcohol and drug dependency unit and a psychiatric hospital.

Admissions requirements Open to high school graduates, college freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors with a minimum 2.5 GPA. Lower GPAs will be considered on a case by case basis.

Attendance is mandatory and students are only allowed to have one excused absence. If a student is absent more than one day, they will automatically fail the course and lose the academic credits.

Credits Each course totals 45 hours and is taught Monday through Friday for a total of 3 credits.

Grades No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/Fail grade options are not available.

Transcripts are issued by Veritas University. On completion of the program an official copy of the transcript will be sent to your home institution.

COURSES

Choose one of the courses below. Classes are taught Monday through Friday for a total of 45 hours.

History 323/HIS 3293 (3 credits)

Costa Rican Health Care System and Tropical Medicine

Costa Rica's health care system is socialized and ranks excellent in health indicators. The course focuses on the history and development of the public health care system within the context of the Costa Rican sociopolitical and economic situation. A strong emphasis is placed on how the system works, pointing out both its strong and weak points. An additional objective, of fundamental importance in understanding this system, is the study of Costa Rica as a tropical country, specifically the prevention and transmission of relevant tropical diseases.

Social Science 307/HHD 3070 (3 credits) Conflict Resolution and Health Care

Health service delivery today encounters frequent conflicts, disputes and other difficult situations, many derived from larger changes occurring in health care systems around the world. These conflicts include differences due to multiculturalism; the appropriateness and quality of care; gender issues; power disputes and arguments between providers and recipients over institutional and funding policies. The costs and effects of violence will be part of this course, particularly in regard to the WHO definition of health. Costa Rican health care systems will also be reviewed.

This course offers a framework to integrate professional experience with functional communication and mediation skills. Students are encouraged to explore and develop their leadership on matters of public health.



PRAGUE, CZECH REPUBLIC

CHARLES UNIVERSITY

art | Czech language | history | politics | sociology

LIVE

Spend 3 weeks in the capital of the Czech Republic, a city composed of picturesque towns, each of which still retains its own unique character. Lose yourself in Prague's rich culture; where aspiring young writers and artists gather, jazz musicians improvise in the open air, locals sip coffee in art-nouveau cafés and clubs stay open until dawn.

Explore the castles and cathedrals, find out about the history of the Jewish ghetto in the Jewish Museum, discover the colorful houses of Golden Lane, once home to Prague's goldsmiths and Franz Kafka, one of the 20th century's most influential writers.

LEARN

Study at the historic Charles University, earning 3 credits taking a course from fields including art, history, Czech language, politics and sociology. The central themes to the courses concern Czech, Central European and Eastern European issues in an exclusive focus or comparative perspective. You will also have a seminar on the basics of the Czech language giving you the essentials to be able to communicate while you are in Prague. Many of the courses combine classroom based learning with field trips.

EXPLORE

Stroll over the Charles Bridge, enjoy coffee and cake in one of Prague's many iconic cafés, visit one of the famed breweries for a tour or enjoy a musical performance in one of Prague's excellent concert venues. The program also includes a full-day excursion to Karlovy Vary, home of the Czech International Film Festival.



INCLUDED EXCURSION

KARLOVY VARY (DAY TRIP)

Visit the spa town of Karlovy Vary (formerly Carlsbad), location of the Czech International Film Festival. Drop by the Grandhotel Pupp which was used in the Oscar winning 2014 film Grand Budapest Hotel.

CHARLES UNIVERSITY, PRAGUE

The Univerzita Karlova (Czech name of Charles University) is the oldest university in Central Europe, founded in 1348 by Charles IV. The author Franz Kafka enrolled at Charles University in 1901 for eight semesters of law school. Today over 50,000 students are enrolled at Charles University.

During the brief lifetime of democratic Czechoslovakia (1918-38), academic life was liberalized. After the period of Nazi occupation, during which all universities were

closed, normal university life began again in 1945. After the Velvet Revolution of 1989, the idea of strict planning according to state ideology was abolished and academic freedom and a high degree of autonomy from the state became the goals of the new era. Charles University has hosted international students from its beginnings until today.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Earn 3 credits studying at Charles University, taking one course from those listed.

Admissions requirements Open to college sophomores, juniors and seniors with a minimum 3.0 GPA, who are currently enrolled in an undergraduate degree program.

Attendance is required to receive full credit. Students exceeding the permitted numbers of unexcused absences may lose all or partial credit.

Credit hours are in parentheses. Credits are equal to American credits based on one credit for a minimum of 15 classroom hours plus home study. This course will meet for 45 hours of teaching and tutorials, Monday to Friday throughout the program.

Grades No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/Fail grade options are not available.

Transcripts are issued by Charles University, Prague. On completion of the program, an official copy of the transcript will be sent to your home institution.

COURSES

Classes are taught Monday through Friday for 4 hours per day a total of 45 hours. Choose one course from those listed below.

ART 301 (3 credits)

Czech and European Art and Architecture

Provides a general overview of the Fine Arts development in Europe with a special focus on Central Europe and monuments in Prague. Special attention will be paid to the unique characteristics and developments of art (e.g. Prague Castle, Baroque churches, Czech cubism) and to the most glorious periods in the history of Czech Lands. The course will also focus on important artists and movements. The class is divided into two parts; a lecture in the classroom and a field trip to a local museum or other monuments or buildings in Prague.

CZE 101 (3 credits)

The Czech Language

The course is designed to teach students the basics of the Czech language and at the same time, to extend their knowledge of Czech culture and everyday life. The communicative approach and everyday vocabulary are emphasized, students are supposed to communicate in various situations of everyday life (introducing oneself, asking about directions, shopping, restaurants, daily routine, likes and dislikes). Various linguistic skills should be developed in balance: knowledge of grammar, comprehension, speaking, and writing.

HST 318 (3 credits)

Czech and Central European History

This course will focus on the history of Bohemia and Moravia (historically the Lands of the Bohemian Crown, today the Czech Republic) since primeval times till present. It will also look at the history of the peoples in this territory (ancient cultures, Celts, Germanic tribes, Slavonic tribes, Czechs, Germans, Jews, Slovaks, Gypsies, other minorities) and cover broad themes of politics, society and cultural history.

POL 315 (3 credits)

Comparative Politics: Transformation of Czechoslovakia and the Czech Republic

Sharing the same geopolitical position within the Eastern Bloc, the individual cases – i.e. Czechoslovakia, Poland, Hungary and others – differed significantly, however, in their respective points of departure, as well as in political institutional solutions chosen in the course of their transitions. Students will be encouraged to challenge the mainstream understanding of "transition" as a predictable, gradual and irreversible progress towards the standard "Western" model. The course is designed as a seminar based on a guided discussion about carefully selected texts collected in a reader; active participation of the student is essential.

SOC 300 (3 credits) Sociology of Food

Food does more than just help humans survive and grow. It is a symbolic system that reflects the everyday habits of humans, norms of societies, as well as deeper, internalized meanings. Food will thus become a lens through which students will see and analyze their different cultures in a new light.

We shall trace the histories of some of the most significant meals of the Czech Republic (and former Austro-Hungarian empire). Their transformations will help us to understand the social changes that took place in Central Europe from a different perspective. Questions such as gender relations, families, political economy, health (obesity, anorexia, bio food), ecology and the nation-state will be discussed. We will read academic articles that respond to these questions in various national and ethnic contexts.

There will be workshops in which students will cook a Central European meal and discuss it with a Czech chef.

THE GALÁPAGOS ISLANDS, ECUADOR

UNIVERSIDAD SAN FRANCISCO DE QUITO (USFQ)

environmental science

LIVE

Synonymous with naturalist Charles Darwin and the theory of evolution, the Galápagos Islands, located about 600 miles west of continental Ecuador in the Pacific Ocean, symbolize a defining moment in the history of life on Earth and the way we see the world and ourselves. This program offers students a unique and unparalleled opportunity to experience and discover the diverse ecology of the archipelago that so enthralled Darwin and to learn about the vital conservation work being done to protect these extraordinary islands and the unique species they are home to.

LEARN

The Galápagos program gives students the opportunity to earn 3 credits studying an environmental science course in one of the most pristine natural laboratories in the world. Based at Universidad San Francisco de Quito (USFQ) Extension Campus on the island of San Cristóbal, you will study the Galápagos' major ecosystems and learn about them first-hand on academic field excursions which take you into the designated visitor sites to discover species of flora and fauna that exist nowhere else on Earth.

EXPLORE

The program begins at USFQ Cumbayá Campus in Quito, Ecuador, where you will have an orientation and introductory class before flying to San Cristóbal Island, Galápagos. In addition to visits and field trips in and around San Cristóbal students will spend two days on Santa Cruz, the second largest of the islands, located in the center of the archipelago. The excursion includes a visit to the Charles Darwin Research Station.

LIFE ON SAN CRISTÓBAL ISLAND, GALÁPAGOS

HOUSING AND MEALS



San Cristóbal Homestay

San Cristóbal has a population of about 6,000 inhabitants. Most of the islanders live in the port city of Puerto Baquerizo Moreno and are involved in either the tourism or fishing industry. It is a close-knit and conservative community with a rich cultural history. By staying with local families you will gain a unique insight into island life and how the locals live and work. Students receive breakfast and dinner with the family and lunch on daily activities.

BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

Learning does not begin or end in the classroom. Visits and field trips are a key part of your academic study in the Galápagos, while social and cultural activities in Quito give you a better understanding of Ecuador, the South American country which governs the islands.

» Welcome lunch

- » Visit to El Junco, a permanent fresh water lake where you can see frigate birds bathing to preen their feathers
- » La Lobería, a coral sand beach where you can see sea lions, a large colony of marine iguanas and birds
- » La Galapaguera, a man-made breeding program for tortoises and an information center for visitors. You can see giant land tortoises living in a semi-natural habitat
- » Kicker Rock one of San Cristóbal Island's most iconic sites and an excellent location for spotting manta rays, sea turtles and sharks
- » Frigate Bird Hill to spot the magnificent frigate birds
- » The Interpretation Center which focuses on the history of the archipelago from its volcanic origins to the present
- » The Isla Lobos to see the nests of the blue-footed boobies
- » Quito historic center and Middle of the World Monument guided tour or guided visit to Otovalo Market

» Farewell dinner

USFQ and AIFS promote conservation and sustainable tourism in the Galápagos Islands through education and research. All visits on the islands are to designated visitor sites.

INCLUDED EXCURSION

The program also includes an excursion to another island within the Galápagos archipelago.

EXCURSION TO SANTA CRUZ ISLAND (2 DAYS)

Travel by speedboat to Santa Cruz, the island with the largest population of all the Galápagos and the most developed due to its history of human settlement and agriculture which began in the 20th century. Settlers from the U.S. and Europe were attracted by the variety of wildlife and vegetation allowing farmers to rear cattle and plant crops including avocados, coffee and sugarcane. The island is the location of the Charles Darwin Research Station, an international non-profit scientific organization which works with the government of Ecuador to provide scientific knowledge and assistance to ensure the conservation of the Galápagos. Students will visit the Research Station to gain a better understanding of its vital work in safeguarding the Galápagos Islands. Visit the Lava Java Organic Coffee Plantation to learn about sustainable business in an island setting. You will spend 2 nights in a hotel with breakfast and one lunch included and have a free afternoon to explore the island on your own.

UNIVERSIDAD SAN FRANCISCO DE QUITO

La Universidad San Francisco de Quito (USFQ) is one of Ecuador's top-ranked universities and the only private, liberal arts university in the country. Founded in 1988, USFQ is a community of 7,000 students and 300 professors and is a leader in education, research, creativity and entrepreneurship in Latin America. USFQ opened its extension campus on San Cristóbal Island, Galápagos, in 2002 to promote conservation in the Galápagos through education and research.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Earn 3 credits taking an Environmental Science course.

Admissions requirements Open to high school graduates, college freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors with a minimum GPA of 2.5.

Attendance is required to receive full credit. Students exceeding the permitted number of unexcused absences may lose all or partial credit.

Credits are in parentheses. Credits are equal to American credits based on one credit for a minimum of 15 contact hours in the form of class time or experiential activities (excursions, visits and lectures at sites).

Grades No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/Fail grade options are not available.

Transcripts are issued by the Universidad San Francisco de Quito. On completion of the program an official copy of the transcript will be sent to your home institution.

COURSE

Environmental Science 310 (3 credits) Ecosystems and Biodiversity in the Galápagos

This course aims to give students an overview of the Galápagos Islands and their unique role in changing our understanding of the biology of life. Students will learn about the formation of the islands and how this, along with their oceanographic setting, gave rise to the distinct biological communities found on each island. The course will delve into the human history of the islands and discover how colonization has brought direct and indirect threats to the Galápagos. Students will learn about and discuss the different approaches that have been taken to minimize, mitigate and eliminate these threats over the last fifty years. Finally, the course will investigate the future and discuss how the decisions of today will shape the Galápagos of the next fifty years.





LONDON, ENGLAND

DAY EXCURSION TO OXFORD

Oxford is famous the world over for its University and place in history. For over 800 years, it has been a home to royalty and scholars. A professional guide will escort you on a journey through the English countryside to this beautiful town, home to the oldest university in the English-speaking world having been in existence for over nine centuries. You will visit one of the colleges and have free time to explore the quaint streets.

OPTIONAL EXCURSION

PARIS, FRANCE (3 DAYS - \$595)

Travel through the Channel Tunnel on the Eurostar high speed train to Paris where you will visit the Eiffel Tower, the Arc de Triomphe and Notre Dame Cathedral on a guided tour of the city including a trip to the Louvre Museum.

There will be free time for you to explore Paris independently. Take a stroll through the bohemian neighborhood of Montmartre where painters including Monet and Picasso once lived and worked or visit a quintessentially Parisian market.

Fee includes transportation, accommodations, museum entrance and breakfast. A minimum of 15 students is required for the optional excursion to run.

RICHMOND, THE AMERICAN INTERNATIONAL UNIVERSITY IN LONDON

Like the city in which it is located, Richmond, The American International University in London provides a diverse, multicultural environment. The University offers small classes in a wide variety of disciplines taught by faculty from leading British, American and international institutions in fully accredited MA and BA programs. During the academic year, students come to Richmond from more than 100 different countries, although the January term is predominantly American. Small classes and personal attention from the faculty make Richmond an ideal place to study abroad. Richmond is an independent, coeducational, non-profit international liberal arts and professional studies university. The original Richmond College, founded in 1843, was a constituent institution of the University of London until the founding in 1970 of the present university which bears its name and occupies its site. The University is accredited by the Commission on Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. In addition to the U.S. degree granting authority, it has U.K. taught degree awarding powers granted by the U.K. Privy Council. It is the first university in the U.K. to have dual degree awarding powers.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Academic administration is carried out by the Divisional Deans under the supervision of the Richmond Provost. Instructors are drawn from Richmond or other London institutions of higher education.

Admissions requirements Open to college sophomores, juniors and seniors with a minimum 2.5 GPA. Lower GPAs will be considered on a case by case basis. Evidence of academic ability is required in the form of your most recent transcript.

Assessment and grading The course work required varies with the nature of the material covered. Instructors are likely to use some combination of quizzes, papers, final exams, projects and class participation. Grades are awarded by instructors on a 4.0 scale, which assigns values to pluses and minuses within the letter grade awards:

No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/Fail grade options are not available.

Course selection Choose one 3-credit course from the two listed. Courses taken for transfer credit should be approved by your advisor or appropriate person at your home school prior to registration.

Credit hours are in parentheses. Credits for each course are equal to American credits based on one credit for a minimum of 15 classroom hours plus home study. Classes are taught Monday through Friday for a total of 45 hours.

Transcripts are issued by Richmond, The American International University in London. On completion of the program an official copy of the transcript will be sent to your home institution.

COURSES

Choose one of the courses below. Classes are held Monday through Friday for a total of 45 hours.

HST 5425 (3 credits) Historical London

This course surveys the history of London from its Roman origins to the modern cosmopolitan metropolis that it is today. Through a variety of themes, students will explore social, political and architectural developments of this urban center throughout the ages. Students will both read about and visit significant sites within London which illustrate aspects of the history of this great city.

LIT 5405 (3 credits) British Fantasy Writing: Magic Memory

This course explores the long-standing, unique and vibrant tradition of fantasy literature in Britain. It will focus on the major literary fantasies from the past 120 years and their filmed adaptations, including works by Bram Stoker, J.R.R. Tolkien and J.K. Rowling. It will look at how these texts and their filmic counterparts revisit older ideas for novel purposes. Where possible, field trips to sites such as Strawberry Hill (first gothic home) and the Harry Potter Studios will be arranged to supplement this course.

LIVE

Spend 3 weeks in one of the best-known cities in the world, home to countless historical monuments and museums. Paris has a rich past full of writers, artists, architects and political figures. The city has drawn intellectuals, free-thinkers and revolutionaries from Benjamin Franklin, Rousseau and Voltaire, to Gertrude Stein, Sartre and James Joyce. Paris is a modern, fast-paced yet romantic city, bursting with excitement and inspiration from around the world.

LEARN

Earn 3 credits studying at either the Institut de Langue et de Culture Françaises (ILCF) or the Cours de Civilisation Française de la Sorbonne (CCFS), both highly respected institutions whose academic heritage dates back over 100 years. Take a course on the history of architecture in Paris or French fashion. Both courses are taught in English and will include visits to relevant sites in Paris to enhance classroom study.

EXPLORE

Although a cosmopolitan capital city, one of the most charming aspects of Paris is its relatively small size and the ease with which you can travel about and see the sights. Take in the famous local monuments such as the Notre Dame Cathedral, the Eiffel Tower and the Sacré Coeur Basilica, and explore more of France's past on an excursion to the Château of Versailles.

Take an optional day trip to the Champagne region, the historic province where this luxury wine is produced and learn about the history of this most famous of French exports.



INCLUDED EXCURSION

CHÂTEAU OF VERSAILLES

A marvel of splendor and scale, this beautiful example of French classical art began as a royal hunting lodge before Louis XIV moved his court and government there in 1682 and transformed it into the enormous palace and gardens which is today one of France's most iconic destinations. Versailles plays a key role in France's history being a symbol of the then French monarchy's absolute power and just a few steps from the room where the Jeu de Paume Oath took place and French democracy was founded.

OPTIONAL EXCURSION

THE CHAMPAGNE REGION (DAY TRIP - \$145)

Visit Reims, capital of the province of Champagne where this world-famous sparkling wine is produced. The trip starts with a champagne tasting at a French champagne cellar. We will follow this with a visit to Notre Dame Cathedral of Reims, a masterpiece of Gothic art, where French kings were crowned. The tour concludes with a visit to the Museum of the Surrender where Germany officially signed the surrender to end World War II.

Fee includes transportation, a local guide and entrances as indicated. Date is subject to change. A minimum of 12 students is required for the excursion to run.



Admissions Requirements Open to high school graduates, college freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors with a minimum 2.5 GPA. Lower GPAs will be considered on a case by case basis.

Attendance is required for full credit. Unexcused absences are not permitted.

Credit hours are in parentheses. Classes are held for 4 hours a day, Monday through Friday for a total of 45 hours.

Grades No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/Fail grade options are not available.

Transcripts are issued by the Institut de Langue et de Culture Françaises or the Cours de Civilisation Française de la Sorbonne. On completion of the program an official copy of the transcript will be sent to your home institution.

COURSES

Choose one course from either the Institut de Langue et de Culture Françaises (ILCF) or the Cours de Civilisation Française de la Sorbonne (CCFS).

INSTITUT DE LANGUE ET DE CULTURE FRANÇAISES (ILCF)

ILCF is a department of the Catholic University of Paris, a highly respected private university approved and recognized by the French Ministry of Education. Founded in 1948, ILCF is an establishment of intellectual and research excellence. It welcomes 2,500 students every year from all over the world who want to learn French and take courses to become acquainted with French culture and civilization in a French environment. The J-term program offers an art history course in architecture taught in English.

Art History 308 (3 credits)

Paris: World Capital of Arts and Architecture

With a focus on modernity and through visits to significant sites in the city, students learn to classify architectural function and style. Through discussion of social and economic conditions in which various buildings were constructed, students acquire an understanding of the historic conditions that defined the changing Parisian landscape in the 17th to 20th centuries.

COURS DE CIVILISATION FRANÇAISE DE LA SORBONNE (CCFS)

The prestige of the Sorbonne is matched by few educational institutions. A centralized institution from its foundation until 1968, the Sorbonne is now one of the dozen or so independent units of the University of Paris. Dating back to 1919, the Cours de Civilisation Française de la Sorbonne has the status of a private institution for the teaching of French as a foreign language and courses about French culture and civilization. The J-term program offers a fine art course in French fashion taught in English.

Fine Arts 307 (3 credits) Fashion in France 18th-21st Century

The links between fashion and artistic, cultural, social and political contexts across French history are explored. The lasting dominance of Paris in the world of fashion is examined. Students will be able to appreciate how fashion and accessories have been used to express all types of identities. Students will visit different exhibitions and museums. Entrance fees may apply.

LIVE

An edgy, vibrant city that has reinvented itself several times over, Berlin is a modern, trend-setting capital with a complicated history. Its unique combination of grit and glamour will capture the imaginations of those interested in history, culture, art and architecture. Since the fall of the Berlin Wall in 1989 the city has become a powerful symbol of change and freedom. Its influence in the fashion, design and music worlds has led to comparisons with New York City in the 1980s.

Remnants of Berlin's past lie around every corner; as Lonely Planet notes, "Berlin is like a virtual 3D textbook where you find history staring you in the face at every turn." Landmarks such as the Brandenburg Gate, Checkpoint Charlie, the Reichstag and the crumbling remains of the Berlin Wall reflect the many phases of the city's past. For a city that over the last century alone staged a revolution and was headquartered by fascists, bombed to bits, ripped in half and finally reunited, Berlin has evolved into an iconic cultural hotspot.

During your time abroad, attend an internationally-recognized university and earn 3 credits studying courses in culture, history, law, politics, religion and social science, all taught in English, or a German language course (available at 2 levels) for those who wish to experience true cultural immersion. Your courses will also include visits to various sites of interest in the city to give you a truly rounded experience.

and Potsdam and worked as a tour guide. I have also lived abroad in England and Barcelona, Spain. It is a pleasure to accompany students on their journey to broaden their horizons, to explore the city and museums with them or to just find new spots and cafés to discuss the US-German friendship.

I love the ever-changing way of the city, its vibrancy and the laid-back attitude. Berlin has something to offer everyone from museums, to clubs or historical sights like the Berlin Wall. And not far away you will find Potsdam and Dresden, with stunning palaces and gardens.

BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

Learning does not begin or end in the classroom. To help you get a true taste of German culture, various activities will be organized such as:

INCLUDED EXCURSION

POTSDAM (DAY TRIP)

Potsdam (one of the largest UNESCO World Heritage sites in Germany) is undoubtedly one of the country's most picturesque cities, located just a short distance from Berlin on the Havel River. The former Prussian royal seat attracts many visitors with its amazing architecture and wealth of palaces and landscaped gardens including Palace Sanssouci, Palace Cecilienhof (Potsdam Conference site during WWII) and Chinese House. With over 2,000 listed buildings, you can also explore the different historic areas in the city such as the Russian Colony and the Dutch Quarter.

OPTIONAL EXCURSION

WARSAW, POLAND (3 DAYS - \$475)

Warsaw, the capital of Poland, offers visitors a rebuilt gem of an old town. Almost destroyed during WWII it has been beautifully and laboriously reconstructed and placed on the UNESCO World Heritage list. The diverse architecture of socialist concrete buildings, modern skyscrapers and restored Gothic palaces tells its own story of the history and culture of this great city.

Travel by train from Berlin to Warsaw. Take a guided tour of the old town of Warsaw, walk along the Royal Route and visit the market square. Overnight in Warsaw. The next day, visit the Warsaw Uprising Museum. You will have free time to explore the Warsaw Ghetto, the Palace of Culture and Science and take in the town. On day three, visit the Museum of the History of Polish Jews before returning to Berlin.

Fee includes accommodation, breakfast, transportation, sightseeing and entrances as indicated. A minimum of 10 students is required for the tour to run. Dates and itinerary are subject to change.

HUMBOLDT-UNIVERSITÄT ZU BERLIN

The University of Berlin was founded in 1810 and is Berlin's oldest university. Its name was changed to Humboldt in 1949 in honor of the statesman Wilhelm von Humboldt and his brother the naturalist Alexander von Humboldt. The University occupies a former royal palace and was host to Marx and Engels as well as 29 Nobel Prize winners, including Albert Einstein and the nuclear scientist Otto Hahn. AIFS students take courses in the various departments of the University.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Earn 3 credits studying at Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin with a choice of courses in English or a German language course.

Admissions requirements Open to college freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors with a minimum 2.75 GPA (lower GPAs will be considered on a case by case basis).

Attendance is required to receive full credit. Students exceeding the permitted number of absences may lose all or partial credit.

Course selection The program fee includes one 3 credit course chosen from those listed. For a supplemental fee of approximately \$725 you can take two courses for a total of 6 credits (two subject courses or a German language course and a subject course). Bear in mind that taking two courses in 3 weeks is a heavy workload should you be considering this option. Courses taken for transfer credit should be approved by your advisor or appropriate person at your home school prior to registration.

Grades No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/Fail grade options are not available.

Transcripts are issued by Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin. On completion of the program an official copy of the transcript will be sent to your home institution.

Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin awards ECTS (European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System) credits. The number of class hours and ECTS credits will be shown on the transcript to allow each student's home institution the ultimate decision in the awarding of U.S. credit. Recommended U.S. semester credits next to each course description are based on 15 classroom hours per semester credit and are not a conversion of ECTS credits. Students should consult with their University advisors prior to participating in the program to have course credit pre-approved and ensure that they are taking the appropriate amount of credits.





Choose one of the courses below. Suggested credit hours are in parentheses. Credits for each course are equal to U.S. credits based on one credit for a minimum of 15 classroom hours plus home study. Classes are taught Monday through Friday for a total of 45 hours. Courses have 4 ECTS (European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System) credits. All courses are taught in English except for "Berlin in the Winter" language course. The German language course is available at 2 levels: Elementary and Intermediate. Please note that courses are subject to change.

German 101/201 (3 credits)

German Language - Berlin in the Winter

This course is specifically designed for those seeking instruction in the German language and is available at Elementary and Intermediate levels. The course can be combined with an English subject course and is suitable for participants who really want to discover Berlin with extra weekly cultural and social activities offered.

An online placement exam before departure determines the appropriate language level for you. German language classes are taught for 45 contact hours for 3 credits and appear on a Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin transcript. Each course is divided into grammar, conversation, vocabulary and culture and is taught in German. There is a maximum of 15 students in each class.

History/Politics/Social Science 312 (3 credits) The Berlin Wall and Cold War Era

For almost 30 years, the Berlin Wall was a symbol of the division of the city of Berlin, of Germany and of Europe during the era of the Cold War between the two superpowers, the United States of America and the Soviet Union. Consequently, the fall of the Wall in 1989 was a hugely symbolic turning point in world history. But how can we explain the building of such a dividing monument? How can we account for its fall in 1989? And how does the Wall influence our lives today? The course will provide answers to such questions via readings of texts from political science, sociology and history, while also taking the opportunity to explore the ground on which the events between 1961 and 1989 took place.

History/Cultural Studies 314 (3 credits) Cultural Memory - Museums in Berlin

Museums are keepers of our cultural memory. Collecting, preserving and exhibiting are their main purpose. Museums focus on different subjects and face historical and cultural differences in various ways. What is worth collecting, or how are objects labeled, in what way are they displayed? These are essential questions museums pose today.

The course examines how different museums in Berlin answer these questions. Viewing historical and cultural heritage within the context of a collection brings up the issue of how objects are (re-)animated to tell a story within an exhibition. So, visits to collections and current exhibitions such as the Jewish Museum Berlin, the German Historical Museum or the Museum der Dinge are planned. How are exhibitions made? What tools do curators use? What does hands-on mean? How are objects animated, what stories do they tell and how do they respond to questions of gender or race?

Law 315 (3 credits)

Introduction to International Economic Law

Multinational companies such as Google or Apple self-evidently act on a global stage, but today even small businesses participate in international trade. The integration of national companies and the elimination of barriers of trade no longer restricts development to a solely national level. With the growing importance of international commerce, the need for an 'International Economic Law' arises. Common principles of Economic Law will be examined by analyzing leading decisions by international courts. A substantial part of the course will be dedicated to classroom discussion of real-life cases. Students will gain a theoretical and practical understanding of the core branches of International Economic Law, the underpinning institutional frameworks and dispute settlement mechanisms.

Only open to undergraduate law or economics students and/or students with a strong interest in the topic.

Politics/Social Science 309 (3 credits) Germany and the New World Order

This course will try to understand the position a reunified Germany has sought to define for itself in the New World Order that has arisen since the end of the Cold War. Today, a quarter-century after reunification, the contours of a new German foreign policy are becoming visible, which we might dub "middle power politics." New German self-images and ambitions, a changed geopolitical environment, new global tasks and platforms, stronger interdependence with the rest of the world and a growing set of foreign policy instruments amid stagnating resources, all define the character and the reach of German foreign policy today. This course aims to give students a thorough understanding of German foreign policy since reunification, its bases, ideas, instruments and potentials. It will reflect upon present trends in international relations and global governance and ponder how Germany (or any other Western power) can hope to wield power effectively in this New World Order. This is an interdisciplinary course and will approach the concept of "middle power politics" from different perspectives, including those of the political sciences, law and regional studies, as well as from those of international relations and German history.

Religion/Culture 308 (3 credits)

Interreligious and Intercultural Dialogue in Germany

This course aims to examine convergences, divergences and parallel tracks, interrogating tensions evident between Jewish narrative within the culture of memory in Germany (Erinnerungskultur) and endeavors to represent migration today.

The focus will be on museum- and exhibit-oriented institutions, with three to four field trips to relevant sites in Berlin. The trips will be preceded in class by an overview of a theoretical framework on the issues of the construction of "Self" and "Other" and followed by discussions of the field sites in a workshop atmosphere.


Social Science 311 (3 credits)

European City and Regional Development Planning - the case of Berlin The aim of this course is to understand and learn about the different challenges European regions are facing, e.g., integration and migration, social exclusion, demographic change, creative milieus, economic decline, shrinking cities and ecological renewal.

How is an aging society affecting our rural and urban areas? How are migrants integrated in European cities? Does Berlin have a creative class, and if so, how does it affect the city?

These are only some of the questions that will be discussed in the course. The city of Berlin is a hotspot for various regional developments. As a result, several of these aspects will be explored and explained during short excursions and day trips in Berlin (e.g., ethnic businesses and the migration situation in Neukölln, the newly developing zone Tempelhofer Feld).

Students of all relevant disciplines who are interested in different aspects of European regional development, including city and regional planning, geography, politics, social sciences and economics, are most welcome to join this course.



COURSES

Students choose one course from the options below. Classes are taught Monday through Friday for a total of 45 hours.

AH 2122 (3 credits)

Topography and Monuments of Ancient Athens

This is a site-based archaeology course giving students an introduction to the topography and monuments of Athens from the Geometric period up to the Roman period. Students will gain familiarity with the archaeology, history and culture of this important ancient city, and as much of the learning takes place outside of the classroom, it will truly give students the opportunity to view the city from a new perspective.

\$100-\$150 museum entrance fees and transportation to sites not included.

FILM TBC (3 credits)

Urban Film Narratives: Encountering the City

The history of cinema and the development of the modern city are intimately related. This course uses Athens and its multifaceted urban landscape to explore representations of urbanity and cities on film, to understand how such representations are revelatory of identity. Screenings from the master works of cinema that draw heavily on the representation of cities will cover a variety of genres, film cultures and filmmakers. Athens will then be used as a prism through which the themes raised will be examined in a direct and personal way. Practical exercises will require students to

engage directly with the city in order to consider broader themes and global currents that define modern urban experience. Regular classes are complemented by fieldtrips whereby students will be entering the city to complete their assigned research and exercises. Students are expected to bring their own cameras (which may also be the camera on their smart phones) to undertake the visual and aural exercises.

HY 3061 (3 credits)

Modern Greece: A Troubled History

This course covers the developments in Greece from the Balkan Wars and the National Schism to the present. Particular attention will be paid to the role of Greece in the two world wars, the causes and consequences of the Civil War and the Dictatorship of 1967-1974 and the nature of the restored democracy after the fall of the junta.

IB 2006 (3 credits) International Business

This course focuses on the essentials of international business and will give students an insight into the international business environment, international business law, cross-cultural interaction, international accounting, international finance, comparative management, international marketing and global corporations.

As my father was a professor at the University of Hyderabad, I lived on the campus for 10 years, so I am extremely familiar with the place that will be your temporary home! I also lived in the U.S. for 12 years so have experience in both education systems. I have an MA in Media Studies and Education from Penn State University and a PhD in Communications from the University of Hyderabad. I fully understand the adjustment you will experience as you acclimate to this new culture—you can think of me as your chief go-to person, coordinator, mediator, guide and friend while you are staying here in India.

In India's bustling and hectic capital city, you will visit the colonial buildings of New Delhi (including the Parliament of India and India Gate), the Jama Masjid (the largest and best-known mosque in India) and the Red Fort. You will also have free time to explore Chandni Chowk, one of Old Delhi's most famous markets.

Take in the stunning and captivating Taj Mahal during your visit to Agra. Generally considered the world's finest example of Moghul architecture the Taj Mahal was built in the 17th century by Shah Jahan as a mausoleum for his beloved wife Mumtaz Mahal. The white marble "Taj" is India's most precious monument, a romantic tribute to a lost love which never fails to leave a lasting impression.

Travel onward to Fatehpur Sikri, the abandoned former capital city of the Moghul Empire. Built from local red sandstone, the city includes numerous palaces, halls and mosques.

Finally, you will travel to Jaipur, known as the 'Pink City'. You will visit the Amber Fort, perched on a ridge above the city and have the opportunity to take an elephant ride. You will also see the famous Palace of the Winds and the impressive 18th century Jantar Mantar observatory.

WARANGAL (DAY TRIP)

VISAS



Students traveling to India must apply for a visa with the appropriate Indian Embassy or Consulate as soon as they receive the required documents from AIFS. After acceptance AIFS will provide detailed instruction and the necessary official documents for obtaining the visa.



UNIVERSITY OF HYDERABAD

The University of Hyderabad established the Study in India Program (SIP) in 1998, an interdisciplinary program of courses designed especially for international students which emphasizes heritage, continuity and change in India.

This program is coordinated and taught by faculty and guest faculty of the University of Hyderabad and is taught in English. Faculty at the Study in India program are appointed by the University both from its own faculty and from cooperating institutions and are supervised by the Director of the Study in India Program.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Academic administration is carried out by the Resident Director in coordination with the AIFS office and the Director of the Study in India Program.

Admissions requirements Open to sophomores, juniors, and seniors with a minimum 2.75 GPA (lower GPAs will be considered on a case by case basis.)

Assessment and grading The University of Hyderabad uses a 7-point grade scale. Instructors will use a combination of assignments, quizzes, presentations, and exams in order to assess grades.

Attendance is required to receive full credit. Students exceeding the permitted number of unexcused absences may lose all or partial credit.

Credit Hours Each credit requires a minimum of 15 classroom hours plus home study. The course on this program is a 3-credit course for a total of 45 hours.

Grades No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/fail grade options are not available.

Transcripts are issued by the University of Hyderabad. On completion of the program an official copy of the transcript will be sent to your home institution.

COURSE

History/Social Science 304 (3 credits) Contemporary India

This is an intensive academic program that deals with the diversities and complexities of India today and its emerging role in the twenty-first century. It is designed to provide an overview of socio-cultural, political-economic realms and developmental issues through a multi-disciplinary prism. The course content will be delivered through a series of lectures by faculty of the University who are experts in their respective fields and will engage you with new questions, perspectives and ideas. Readings will be provided to the students to accompany the lectures. Students are expected to keep up with the readings and participate in classroom discussions and debates.

The course deals with issues such as caste, religion, socio-cultural stratification, and is designed to bring a historical context to contemporary issues and realities. Topics include subjects and perspectives on philosophy, popular culture, media, development, literature, art, law, environmental policies, among others with themes including India and international relations, gender and society in contemporary India and Indian philosophy. The course includes lectures, interactive sessions, field trips, audio/video presentations, films and documentaries. There will also be cultural activities and field trips as part of the planned itinerary.

TRINITY COLLEGE DUBLIN

Founded in 1592 by Queen Elizabeth I, Trinity College Dublin is Ireland's oldest and top-ranked university. Trinity's 47-acre campus is packed with historic buildings, cobblestoned walkways and cutting-edge facilities, creating a tightly-knit community in the center of Dublin. Trinity's alumni, including Oscar Wilde, Samuel Beckett, Jonathan Swift and Ernest Walton, have helped shape the modern world. Offering degrees in dozens of subjects, many ranking in the world's top 100, Trinity blends four centuries of academic excellence with pioneering research and a vibrant student community in the heart of a European capital city. Students taking the 'Modern Irish Writing' course will be taught by expert faculty from the prestigious School of English at Trinity College Dublin, supported by advanced research and teaching assistants from the University. The School of English at Trinity is one of the oldest in Britain or Ireland, and in 1867 it founded the first ever Chair in English Literature. Teaching will take place in the Arts Building at Trinity College Dublin, and specialist workshops will be taught in the historic Trinity library, built between 1712 and 1732.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Attendance is required to receive full credit. Students exceeding the permitted numbers of unexcused absences may lose all or partial credit.

Credit hours Credits are equal to U.S. credits based on one credit for a minimum of 15 classroom hours plus home study. This course will meet for 45 hours of teaching and tutorials, Monday to Friday throughout the program and is recommended for 3 credits.

Grades No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/Fail grade options are not available.

Transcripts are issued by Trinity College Dublin. On completion of the program an official copy of the transcript will be sent to your home institution.

Transcripts are issued using ECTS (European Credit Transfer System) with 6 ECTS equivalent to approximately 3 US credits. Students should confer with their academic advisor at their home institution in the U.S. to discuss credit conversion and gain course pre approval before they arrive.

COURSE

LIT 315 (3 credits)

Modern Irish Writing

Trinity College Dublin has been the home of Irish literature in English for four centuries. The School of English 'Modern Irish Writing' course is an exciting program aimed at introducing students to the best of Irish literary tradition and culture from 1900 to the present day. You will read the poetry of William Butler Yeats, Patrick Kavanagh and Seamus Heaney, discuss the theater of Samuel Beckett and Marina Carr, consider the short stories of James Joyce, Sean O'Faolain, Frank O'Connor, Mary Lavin and Claire Keegan. In addition to offering students a broad overview of Irish writing in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries, the module will have special components on the poetry of Seamus Heaney, James Joyce's Dublin and contemporary Irish writing. Students will be able to visit various Dublin city settings such as the James Joyce Centre, the Hugh Lane Gallery, the National Museum, the National Library and see a play at Dublin's iconic Abbey Theatre, established by W.B. Yeats and Lady Augusta Gregory in 1904. Each student will receive a course reader.

Supporting academic visits include entrance to the Old Library and the Book of Kells, and a session on manuscripts and archives in the historic Trinity College Library.

SL 310 (3 credits)

Young People, Youth Culture and Youth Services in Ireland

Community work involves the development and empowerment of communities and facilitating the active participation of people in addressing issues that affect them collectively. Youth work is based on the same principles as community work but focuses on young people and is defined in Irish legislation and policy as a process of personal and social development based on voluntary principles of equality and inclusiveness. This module provides an opportunity for students to engage in an in-depth consideration of social scientific, policy and youth work practice perspectives on young people, youth culture and youth services in contemporary Ireland. The course will combine classroom study with individual and small group work with study visits to projects and organizations of interest.

This program is taught by Richmond, The American International University in London. The University is an independent, non-profit international university of liberal arts and professional studies. ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

COURSE

Class is held for a total of 45 hours and is taught in English.

HST/ANTH 5825 (3 credits)

Italian Food and Culture

According to anthropologist Jon Holtzman, the tastes and flavors of a country's traditional table are a meaningful representation of its collective memory. This course will thus show the deep link between geography, history and the culture of Italian regional dishes which have made Italy known worldwide. Attention will be devoted to the development of the Italian food culture, and students will be introduced through lectures, seminars, guest lectures and tastings/visits to local producers, to the 'invisible' thread that links the resources of many Italian areas to their food practices. We will also analyze different food practices of the Italian and Mediterranean diet, highlighting regional gastronomic traditions and their origins. Among the topics to be discussed are the issues of Italian regional differences in how food is prepared, the representation of Italian food practices in media and cinema, food symbolism in Italian culture, food ethics and sustainable agriculture, with an examination of today's fast and slow food traditions in Italy.

"It's one thing to study food in books, quite another to eat in and with the communities that defend the simple pleasures of traditional Slow Food, Brixen and other remote mountain areas in Italy recognized early on that the dignity of place and people threatened by globalization are the very things that define their communities. Here's your chance to experience first-hand that there is more to life than scale, speed and success through experiential, tactile learning in a beautiful international setting."



Choose one of the courses below. With the exception of Italian language, all courses are taught in English. Classes are taught Monday through Friday for a total of 45 hours. A minimum enrollment of 10 is required to confirm a course. Language classes are always offered. Should Italian courses not reach the minimum enrollment, students may attend classes at Leonardo da Vinci school a short walking distance from the Richmond Center with other international students.

Italian Language Courses

These 45-hour courses are taught at the Rome Study Center by highly-qualified local instructors. A1, A2 etc. after course code indicates CEFR (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages) level.

ITL 3831 - A1 (3 credits) **Elementary Italian I**

A thorough, basic introduction to the Italian language for those with little or no previous experience, the course teaches essential vocabulary and grammar and develops students' ability to communicate in an authentic linguistic context.

ITL 3832 - A1/A2 (3 credits)

Elementary Italian II

Designed for students who already have some knowledge of Italian, the course revises basic grammar and vocabulary before progressing to more complex structures and functions leading up to the next, Intermediate, level. Classes are conducted mainly in Italian, with ample opportunity for student oral practice.

ITL 4831 - A1/B1 (3 credits)

Intermediate Italian I

This course helps students to develop their ability to communicate effectively and accurately, using an expanded range of vocabulary. Conversation practice improves listening and interpretation skills. Reading and writing exercises improve skills in understanding prose and writing. Prerequisite: successful completion of 3/4 semesters of Italian.

ITL 4832 - B2 (3 credits) Intermediate Italian II

This course enables students to understand and respond to guite complex lines of argument, both in oral and in written form. Students are introduced to more complex forms of grammar and more sophisticated vocabulary, to give them the ability to carry out and refine skills in listening, speaking, reading and writing in Italian.

ITL 5830 - B2/C1 (3 credits) Advanced Italian

This course introduces students to advanced structures and vocabulary, which will enable them to interact with the Italian world at a sophisticated level. It enables them to understand lectures and complex lines of argument, including various attitudes and viewpoints, both in oral and in written form. They should become fluent and spontaneous in verbal interaction, and will be able to present and sustain an argument, both orally and in evidenced-based writing.

AVC 5840 (3 credits)

Art and Culture in Rome: 800 BC - 2000 AD

This course examines the history and society of Rome and its architectural and artistic expression as it developed over a period of 3000 years. Students study key examples of architecture, monuments and art from Classical Rome through to the Renaissance, Baroque and the modern period.

Class visits may include Largo Argentina and the Pantheon, Colosseum and Forums, Vatican Museums (Sistine Chapel) and St. Peter's Basilica, Castel Sant'Angelo and Piazza Augusto Imperatore.

PSY 4800 (3 credits) **Cross-Cultural Psychology**

This course provides a multicultural and global perspective on psychology. Students analyze how culture influences human thoughts and behavior across cultures by integrating theoretical and applied components of cross-cultural psychology with theory and research.

RLG 5810 (3 credits) **Comparative World Religions**

This course explores the monotheistic religions of the Near East (Judaism, Christianity and Islam), those of India and the Far East (Hinduism, Buddhism and Taoism) and the "new-age" faiths. Special emphasis is laid on the philosophical and psychological basis of each religion and common themes such as "the self", suffering and free will and ethics. Guest speakers and class visits form an integral part of the course.

SCL 5855 (3 credits) **Culture and Style in Italy**

This course is recommended for students with an interest in contemporary Italian culture and style. The course focuses on aspects of post-war Italian culture including cuisine, fashion, religious beliefs and the persistence of superstition. Lectures cover topics such as the role of women, food and wine as cultural traditions, the effect of social change and culture and style. Lectures are supported by field visits, food and wine tasting sessions and audio-visual materials. Class visits may include the historical urban Testaccio market; Eataly, a high-end chain of Italian food markets; an organic farm; the Italian Parliament and Alta Roma, the fashion agency that promotes Made-In-Italy products and values.

AIFS offers two programs with the University of Stellenbosch, an historic university town in the winelands of the Western Cape that is surrounded by spectacular mountain ranges. January is a wonderful time of year to visit when the summer weather showcases the best of the country's stunning landscapes.

LEARN

Choose between two programs each worth 3 credits: photography or South African wine and winemaking. The photography program begins with theory lectures and site visits in and around Stellenbosch. This is followed by a 6-day practical component traveling through the Garden Route which stretches along the Western Cape coastline and is famed for its stunning natural beauty. Accompanied by University faculty and focusing on travel photography you will improve your photography skills and gain practical experience.

South Africa is famed for its wine. Hosted by the University's Viticulture and Oenology department, the South African wine and winemaking program gives students a unique insight into the history and industry of winemaking in the region and environmental initiatives in oenology. The program includes technical winetasting workshops and visits to vineyards.

STELLENBOSCH UNIVERSITY

Stellenbosch University (SU) is home to a vibrant academic community of 29,000 students including 4,000 foreign students from 100 countries. Located amongst the scenic Boland Mountains in the winelands of the Western Cape this elegant historical town has a unique campus atmosphere. On the main campus, paven walkways wind between campus buildings - some dating from previous centuries; others just a few years old. This together with



the scenic beauty of the area, state-of-the-art, environmentally friendly facilities and technology, as well as visionary thinking about the creation of a sustainable 21st-century institution, makes for the unique character of Stellenbosch University.

In 2018 Stellenbosch University marked its centenary year and 25 years since it welcomed its first study abroad students onto campus. Internationalization remains at the heart of the university's mission and AIFS is delighted to have celebrated 20 years of partnership with the University during which nearly 2000 American students have studied on semesters, summer and J term programs in Stellenbosch through AIFS.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Earn 3 credits studying at Stellenbosch University taking a course in Travel Photography or South African Wine and Winemaking.

Admissions requirements Open to college sophomores, juniors and seniors with a minimum 2.7 GPA, who are currently enrolled in an undergraduate degree program.

Applicants for the South African Wine and Winemaking Program are required to have already studied a relevant subject such as agriculture, winemaking, soil science etc.

Attendance is required to receive full credit. Students exceeding the permitted numbers of unexcused absences may lose all or partial credit.

Credit hours are in parentheses. Credits are equal to American credits based on one credit for a minimum of 15 classroom hours plus home study. Courses will meet for 45 hours in a combination of classroom-based teaching and academic field trips.

Grades No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/Fail grade options are not available.

Transcripts are issued by Stellenbosch University. On completion of the program an official copy of the transcript will be sent to your home college or university.



COURSES

Choose one course for 3 credits.

Photography TBA (3 credits) Travel Photography

The aim of the course is to teach students about photography with a focus on travel photography theory. Students will gain knowledge of their own cameras, improve their photography skills and gain practical experience in the areas of landscape and portrait photography as well as wildlife photography when traveling along the Garden Route. At the end of each day students will print the best two or three of their photographs receiving feedback from a professional photographer and the course will end with an exhibition of their work.

Viticulture and Oenology TBA (3 credits) South African Wine and Winemaking

The aim of this course is to immerse students in the South African wine culture, giving them an overview of the wine industry and the challenges of the industry being in South Africa. A series of lectures by academic staff will cover applied viticulture and oenological aspects. There will be a series of technical tastings by highly respected world class winemakers which will give students an excellent understanding of the diversity of wines and wine styles made in South Africa. The main goal is to equip students with knowledge on the status of the industry and the excellent wines South Africa has so that they can return home as ambassadors for the SA grape and wine industry and excite people in their own country.

UNIVERSITAT AUTÒNOMA DE BARCELONA

The Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona (UAB) was founded in 1968. It is a relatively young university; however, in its short history it has moved forward at a rapid pace and now ranks among the top 5 universities in Spain and the top 15 in the world among young universities. (Times Higher Education Young University Rankings 2018). AIFS students will attend classes at the beautiful historical pavilions of the Sant Pau campus. The Sant Pau campus is located in the historic UAB-Casa Convalescència building, which was part of the "Hospital de la Santa Creu i Sant Pau," in the central area of the city known as "L'Eixample."

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Earn 3 credits studying Spanish Art and Cultural Heritage or International Business.

Admissions requirements Open to high school graduates, college freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors with a minimum 2.0 GPA.

Attendance is required to receive full credit. Students exceeding the permitted numbers of unexcused absences may lose all or partial credit.

Credit hours are in parentheses. Credits are equal to American credits based on one credit for a minimum of 15 classroom hours plus home study. Classes are taught Monday through Friday.

Grades No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/Fail grade options are not available.

Transcripts are issued by the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona. On completion of the program an official copy of the transcript will be sent to your home institution.

Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona awards ECTS (European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System) credits. The number of class hours and ECTS credits will be shown on the transcript to allow each student's home institution the ultimate decision in the awarding of U.S. credit. Recommended U.S. semester credits shown next to each course description are based on 15 classroom hours per semester credit and are not a conversion of ECTS credits. Students should consult with their university advisors in the U.S. prior to participating in the program to have course credit pre-approved and ensure that they are taking the appropriate amount of credits.

COURSES

Choose one of the courses below. Classes are taught Monday through Friday for a total of 45 hours.

Art 327 (3 credits) Spanish Art and Cultural Heritage

This course gives an overview of the art history of Spain from prehistoric times to the present, dealing in more detail with the Baroque period, Modernism and 20th century art. Visits to museums keep the class as close to real artistic practice as possible. Attendance and oral participation are important: students are expected to contribute to class development with questions and commentaries, reading assignments and by visiting exhibitions in preparation. Interest in art and architecture is a prerequisite.

Business 307 (3 credits) International Business

This course provides an overview of the challenges facing businesses as they compete on the global playing field. Focus is on the economic foundations of international business and the main forces that shape business across countries: political, economic, cultural and legal. The last part of the course will analyze the internal aspects of a company oriented towards international business.

UNIVERSITY OF GRANADA

Spanish and Islamic Civilization and Culture

LIVE

Granada was the last Moorish kingdom to fall in the reconquest of 1492 and the legacy of Spain's 800 years under Islamic rule permeates every corner of the city: in the streets surrounding the former silk bazaar, the teterías (tea houses), in the historic Albayzín (the Arabic quarter) and the Moorish bathhouses. The showstopper is the Alhambra Palace - one of the best examples of Islamic architecture and craftsmanship in the world. Nestled at the foot of the Sierra Nevada, Granada is both serene in its setting and exhilarating in its spirit, monuments and culture.

LEARN

Earn 3 credits studying the impact of Al-Andalus (Muslim Spain) on Spanish history, tradition and language through a series of classes and visits. You will learn about the most important events of the period and visit the most significant monuments and locations, exploring the concept of Islam while drawing these connections together to understand how the Moors influenced culture, literature, art and architecture. A taster Arabic lesson will give you some essential communication skills before you visit Morocco.

EXPLORE

Highlights include a 3-day excursion to Morocco, North Africa to learn about the ancestry of the Moors who ruled in Spain. Accompanied by AIFS staff you will visit the medina and souk of Tangier, the Royal Palace and food markets in Tetouan and the mountain town of Chaouen known for its distinctive blue buildings.




TANGIER AND TETOUAN, MOROCCO (3 DAYS)

Early departure from Granada to Tarifa. Travel in a fast ferry to Tangier, Morocco. Visit to the Cape Spartel, caves of Hercules and a short stop will be made for a camel ride and then on to visit the medina and the souk of Tangier. Dinner and night in the hotel in Tangier.

After breakfast in the hotel, take a tour of Tetouan including Plaza Moulay El Mehdi, Plaza Hassan I and the Royal Palace. Continue on to the Mellah or Jewish neighborhood and to the medina and souks. Time to sample and shop in the crafts, goods and food markets. Continue on to the mountain town of Chaouen. Lunch in a typical restaurant followed by free time for shopping and bartering. Walking tour of the Alcazaba fortress and the medina. Dinner and show and night in hotel.

On the last morning, depart Tangier for the coastal town of Asilah. Visit the city medina and walls. Free time for lunch before departure. Afternoon ferry to Tarifa and late return to Granada by bus.

GRANADA, SPAIN

UNIVERSITY OF GRANADA

Founded by Emperor Charles V in 1531, the University of Granada is one of the most prestigious universities in Spain with over 70,000 students.

Students attend class at the University of Granada's Centro de Lenguas Modernas. The University has dedicated this center to the teaching of Spanish Language and Culture to foreign students, and to their integration into Spanish society. The Centro has two historic buildings with beautiful courtyards which are totally renovated and equipped with modern classrooms, audio-visual equipment, e-mail facilities and a library. Small groups are the norm and all professors are native Spaniards.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Earn 3 credits studying Spanish and Islamic Culture and Civilization.

Admissions requirements Open to high school graduates, college freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors with a minimum 2.0 GPA.

Attendance is required to receive full credit. Students exceeding the permitted numbers of unexcused absences may lose all or partial credit.

Credit hours are in parentheses. 3 semester credits are recommended for this program consisting of formal classroom classwork and field trips.

Grades No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/Fail grade options are not available.

Transcripts are issued by the University of Granada. On completion of the program an official copy of the transcript will be sent to your home institution.

The University of Granada awards ECTS (European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System) credits. The number of class hours and ECTS credits will be shown on the transcript to allow each student's home institution the ultimate decision in the awarding of U.S. credit. Recommended U.S. semester credits shown next to the course description is based on 15 classroom hours per semester credit and is not a conversion of ECTS credits. Students should consult with their university advisors in the U.S. prior to participating in the program to have course credit pre-approved and ensure that they are taking the appropriate amount of credits.

COURSE

History/Religion/Sociology 310 (3 credits) Spanish and Islamic Civilization and Culture

Discusses the importance and the effect of Islamic rule on Spain's history, tradition, language, and culture. Topics include: the concept of Islam, the message of the Koran, Andalucía under Islamic rule, North African dynasties in Andalucía, the Nazari dynasty of Granada, cultural, literary, and artistic aspects of Islam, and Islamic architecture and symbols as exemplified by the Alhambra. Spanish civilization and contemporary society are examined through themes such as the relationships between professionals, labor and cultural sectors, the aging of the population, gypsies, bullfighting, holidays, gastronomy and flamenco. Audio-visuals, newspapers, magazines and texts are used. Includes an 'essential' Arabic class and several field trips in Granada to sites of historical and cultural relevance.



UNIVERSITY OF SALAMANCA

Founded in 1218, the University of Salamanca is the oldest in Spain. Christopher Columbus consulted the University's faculty before embarking on his famous voyage.

The University of Salamanca is Spain's leading national institution in the teaching of Spanish as a second language and one of the most prestigious universities in Spain. Salamanca is in the region of Spain where the purest Castilian Spanish is spoken.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Earn 3 credits studying Spanish language and culture. Four levels of Spanish are available to students: Elementary, Intermediate, Advanced and Superior. Course level is determined by a placement exam given on arrival in Salamanca regardless of previous experience with the language.

Admissions requirements Open to high school graduates, college freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors with a minimum 2.0 GPA.

Attendance is required to receive full credit. Students exceeding the permitted numbers of unexcused absences may lose all or partial credit.

Credit hours are in parentheses. Credits are equal to American credits based on one credit for a minimum of 15 classroom hours plus home study. Classes are taught Monday through Friday.

Grades No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/Fail grade options are not available.

Transcripts are issued by the University of Salamanca. On completion of the program an official copy of the transcript will be mailed to your home institution.



COURSES

Taught by the University of Salamanca Cursos Internacionales department, classes at all levels are conducted in Spanish by university professors. AIFS participants attend classes with international students in a diverse, multicultural environment. Four main language levels (Elementary to Superior) are further subdivided to accommodate varying skills. A placement exam after arrival determines the appropriate level for you. Students are advised to obtain approval for several different levels of Spanish from their academic advisor in the U.S. prior to arrival in Salamanca, in order to ensure that they receive credit for the course that they test into. Classes meet for a total of 50 hours (3 credits) and for students testing into the Intermediate level and above include: 20 hours of Spanish grammar, 10 hours of Spanish art. Classes for Elementary level students include: 20 hours of Spanish grammar, 10 hours of Spanish art. Of Spanish conversation and composition, 10 hours of vocabulary development and 10 hours of phonetics.

Spanish 102 (3 credits) Intensive Elementary Spanish

For students with no previous Spanish instruction and up to a year of high school or a semester of college Spanish. Focus is on grammar, sentence structure, pronunciation and vocabulary development. Present, past and future tenses are studied in the indicative as well as subjunctive, along with regular and irregular verbs, interrogative and personal pronouns and possessive adjectives. Social and cultural topics covered include manners, introductions, customs, gastronomy, fiestas and traditions.

Spanish 202 (3 credits) Intensive Intermediate Spanish

Solid knowledge of basic Spanish grammar structures and tenses and a fundamental vocabulary are necessary to place in this level. Emphasis is on fluid conversation,

comprehension and vocabulary. Tenses, habitual actions in the past and abstract descriptions are explained. Grammar study is on the imperative, conditional and relative sentences, indirect speech, passive voice, intonation, prefixes, suffixes and affixes. Cultural topics include the influence of mass media on Spanish language, superstitions, beliefs, literature, humor and cinema.

Spanish 302 (3 credits) Intensive Advanced Spanish

For students with a strong background in Spanish, this course deepens comprehension and works at developing a more sophisticated speaking style. Conversational skills are emphasized: conversations, arguments, debate, opinions, concession and opposition. Grammar focus is on verb forms in the past, nominal subordinate sentences, emphatic and metaphoric comparisons and meaning and use of the infinitive, gerund and participle. Cultural aspects include appropriate behavior and manners, stereotypes of regions of Spain and Hispanic countries, "la tertulia" (conversational gatherings), gestures, popular stories and legends.

Spanish 402 (3 credits) Intensive Superior Spanish

Students in this level are essentially bilingual and want to perfect or understand grammatical complexities. Pragmatic issues are expressing and understanding humor, irony, sarcasm, anger, wonder and skepticism, persuading and convincing, expressing cause, consequence and purpose as well as agreement and disagreement. Grammar focuses on the pronoun "se", idioms, colloquial Spanish, changes in sentence structures, direct object complements, paraphrases and Latin American Spanish. Cultural themes are the influence of other cultures on Spain, types of journalism, publicity in the media, dialects, Hispanic American writers, Spain's political system and social attitudes.

Taught by faculty from Richmond, The American International University in London

RICHMOND, THE AMERICAN INTERNATIONAL UNIVERSITY IN LONDON

Richmond is an independent, coeducational, non-profit international liberal arts and professional studies university. The original Richmond College, founded in 1843, was a constituent institution of the University of London until the founding in 1970 of the present university which bears its name and occupies its site. The University is accredited by the Commission on Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. In addition to the U.S. degree granting authority, it has U.K. taught degree awarding powers granted by the U.K. Privy Council. It is the first university in the U.K. to have dual degree awarding powers.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Attendance at all lectures and site visits is mandatory.

Grades No AIFS participant is permitted to take a course without receiving a grade. Pass/Fail grade options are not available.

Transcripts are issued by Richmond, The American International University in London. On completion of the program an official copy of the transcript will be sent to your home institution.

COURSE

AVC 4400 (3 credits) European Art and Architecture

The course, through lectures and site visits, concentrates on the major contributions of Western Europe to world art and architecture. In terms of architecture, visits to sites of Roman antiquity frame a discussion of classical beginnings, which then moves onto the important and unique contributions of England, Holland, France and Italy (Florence and Rome in particular). In terms of painting, although there is some discussion of Classical and Medieval precedents, the focus is on the Italian Early Renaissance in Florence, Venice and Rome, especially the High Renaissance and Baroque periods. The course also considers Dutch and English Art with emphasis on the master works of the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries. The course analyzes major European movements, including Romanticism, Post-Impressionism, Surrealism, Modernism and Post-Modernism, placing these artistic developments in the wider cultural, social and intellectual context of the periods and places in which they took place. The course includes numerous museum and site visits and all fees are included.

Three semester credits are recommended for course work on this program, consisting of approximately 30 hours of formal class work and 50 hours on field trips. It gives a general introduction to the European contribution to world culture and civilization and demonstrates the meaning and significance of art and architecture as a prime source of influence on western civilization. Students are responsible for reading and analyzing assigned material after the related topics have been explained. To meet requirements for 3 semester credits, students must submit a 2,000-word special topics paper together with in-course tests and class papers. The program leader is a European specialist in art and architectural history approved by Richmond.

APPLYING

Applicants to AIFS Study Abroad programs must:

- » Maintain a minimum GPA of 2.5 (unless otherwise stated in the program chapter). Students with slightly lower GPAs may be considered on a case by case basis.
- » Be in good social standing at their home institution.

Students must complete the application and submit it, together with a non-refundable deposit of \$395 (a \$300 program deposit and a \$95 application fee), with a copy of their transcript, to AIFS Study Abroad, January Term Programs. The \$300 deposit is refundable only if the applicant cannot be accepted. No refund will be considered if you fail to complete the application process or withdraw your application before an admissions decision is made. Although students complete a preliminary course selection on the application, final registration takes place on campus. Students should obtain approval for transfer credit from their home college or university before applying. All applicants must be at least 18 years old by the time their AIFS January Term program begins.

Confirmation of acceptance, pre-departure handbooks, program and flight itineraries will be available online at www.aifsabroad.com/login. Participants are sent a final itinerary approximately two weeks before departure. The itinerary constitutes the contract between AIFS and the student.

Students are urged to contact their home institution's study abroad office to ensure that they comply with requirements for study abroad. In order to maintain your enrollment status, facilitate academic credit transfer and to use any applicable financial aid it is important that you follow your school's requirements for study abroad.

WHEN TO ENROLL

Enroll as early as possible, as openings on each campus are limited. Apply before October 1 (September 15 for Berlin, Dublin, Galápagos and Hyderabad) to ensure your best chance of acceptance. New enrollments cannot be accepted less than 50 days prior to departure unless the participant agrees to make his/her own flight arrangements. Participants enrolling within the 50-day period will be reviewed on an individual basis depending on availability of campus and air space.

APPLICATION AND PAYMENT DEADLINES

Applications An initial non-refundable deposit of \$300 and a non-refundable application fee of \$95 (total \$395) are required with the application.

Payment Full payment is due November 15 (October 15 for Berlin, Dublin, Galápagos and Hyderabad programs). Students who fail to make the final payment will not be permitted to register and start the program. Under no circumstances will a student be sent his/her airline ticket until final fees have been paid.

Optional Excursions The deadline for payment for optional excursions is November 15 (October 15 for Berlin, Dublin, Galápagos and Hyderabad programs.)

FEE GUARANTEE

Program fees are guaranteed in U.S. dollars. There are no surcharges for currency fluctuations; however, fees for the optional transportation package (round-trip flights and airport transfers) are subject to adjustment resulting from government or airline surcharges (e.g. fuel) imposed subsequent to catalog publication (December 2018) and will be confirmed at time of invoicing.

AIRLINE TICKETS

If you have selected the Optional AIFS Flight Package, where permitted by the airline, you will be issued with an electronic ticket. Once confirmed, details of your flight information will be available to you on the AIFS website at www.aifsabroad.com/login. You can check here at any time to get your flight information but should make a final check just prior to your departure. A detailed itinerary will be mailed to your home address approximately two weeks prior to departure. If you will not be at your home address at this time, notify AIFS in writing of your new address. Itineraries are sent via UPS (they cannot be sent to a P.O. Box number).

PASSPORTS

1

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You must obtain your own passport. We urge you to apply for (or renew) your passport as soon as you have decided to take part in the program. Some countries require passports be valid for six to seven months beyond the end of the program. To apply for or renew a passport you must:

- obtain an application from a passport office, state or federal court with naturalization jurisdiction or local post office and supply requested information.
- » submit proof of citizenship (birth certificate with raised seal), proof of identity (driver's license or similar document) and two identical passport-size photos (2" x 2") and pay the fee.
- » Applications can take more than 4 weeks to process. Apply early for a passport.

ACADEMIC CREDIT

Most American universities and colleges recognize AIFS programs for academic credit. Since foreign universities do not use the same credit system as American schools, there are certain procedures all AIFS participants should follow.

Each American college or university has its own policy on the acceptance of transfer credits. AIFS does not grant credit itself, nor do foreign universities evaluate students' progress by the awarding of academic credit, the system used by American colleges and universities. Many European universities use the European Credit Transfer System (ECTS) with 6 ECTS credits typically being equivalent to 3 U.S. credits. AIFS serves in an advisory capacity to American institutions about the foreign equivalences and the amount of credit to award for academic work completed abroad. Transcripts are issued by the host institution, not AIFS.

To obtain credit for January Term work, arrangements must be made with the home institution before departure abroad to determine whether credit will be granted for courses offered, and to learn which documents are required from the foreign university to ensure credit. Students should meet with their faculty advisor to discuss courses and placement in foreign language programs. The advisor may suggest further meetings with the appropriate official.

To evaluate a foreign study program, American college administrators require a transcript giving details such as dates of enrollment, courses taken, number of hours per week in each course, etc. All AIFS students are given transcripts for their work issued by the host university abroad. If you have outstanding charges, your transcripts will be withheld until accounts are settled.

Only the American institution can evaluate work overseas, and in all cases, only the American institution can decide to award transfer credit. Most American institutions grant credit for study abroad provided students contact them before departure and successfully complete the necessary examinations at the foreign university and obtain a proper transcript.

HOW TO APPLY FOR TRANSFER CREDIT

Programs Taught by Richmond, The American International University in London (London, Brixen, Rome and the European Art and Architecture program)

Students are provided with undergraduate credit which is fully transferable to U.S. colleges and universities. Richmond is accredited by the Middle States Association of Schools and Colleges.

Programs Taught by Foreign Universities

Students currently enrolled in a U.S. college may be granted transfer credit by their own college or university if they apply for approval from the proper authorities at their academic institution before the start of the program. Students should speak with the appropriate officials at their college or university.

Graduating high school seniors should check with the universities they plan to attend to determine whether credits will transfer. All students receive a transcript directly from the foreign university.

OUTLINE OF JANUARY TERM PROGRAMS

Administration Students on campus are assisted by a Resident Director who works closely with the host university and its professors on behalf of AIFS students. The Resident Director and staff are always available to help. Each large January Term program also has a staff of campus coordinators responsible for organizing excursions and arranging a social and cultural program that introduces students to the local community.

Air Transportation AIFS uses major international airlines such as British Airways, Delta, Lufthansa Airlines, United Airlines and Virgin Atlantic Airways and offers a wide choice of U.S. departure cities. Round trip transportation and airport-to-campus or site transfers are included in program fees for students who elect to purchase the Optional AIFS Flight Package. Students flying one-way or leaving the U.S. on an unscheduled departure date must take the "own transportation" option. Changing to the own transportation option must be done at least 75 days before departure. Students opting for their own arrangements must make transfer arrangements between airports and campuses. Students failing to request flights upon application and/or meet deadlines will be required to pay a late transportation fee of \$250 with any subsequent written flight request or make their own travel arrangements at their expense. Subsequent flight changes are subject to applicable fees. Availability of seats on flights is not guaranteed by the late fee and students may be required to pay a fare differential.

If you wish to make a change to your return flight after tickets are issued, please note the following: All requests are subject to airline availability, and any additional fees assessed by the airline will be passed on to you. Date changes only are permitted; routing changes (change to departure and/or arrival city) are prohibited by the airlines. There will be a \$100 administrative fee for this transaction, plus fees assessed by the airline. Please visit www.aifsabroad.com for further instructions after arrival on campus.

Housing Students live in residence halls, apartments or with host families depending on the program location. Single rooms are sometimes available for a supplement. During the organized travel portions of each program, tourist class hotels as well as student residences are usually used.

STUDENT CONDUCT

Standards of conduct help to ensure satisfaction with the program. Because AIFS programs depend on the good will of host universities, you are required to observe campus regulations and customs relating to students at the university of your choice. AIFS, its Resident Directors and coordinators are in charge of the welfare and behavior of students. Students are expected to cooperate with staff and accept responsibility for adult standards of behavior. Students must obey the laws of the host country.

Probation & Dismissal Students who fail to maintain standards of conduct and academic achievement may be removed from AIFS accommodation or be dismissed without refund.

Students dismissed because of academic or disciplinary standing forfeit all academic credit. A professor may fail a student because of excessive unexcused absences, as well as by examination or other evaluation.

In cases of misconduct, a student may be warned, placed on non-academic probation, academically withdrawn or dismissed from the program as the circumstances warrant. The decision of the Director of AIFS Study Abroad is final.

Full Participation in the academic program is required. Failure to attend class and complete required assignments and tasks is grounds for dismissal without refund.

Alcohol & Drugs Abuse of alcohol and use of illegal drugs and prescription drugs not prescribed to the student are grounds for dismissal without refund. Students must obey the laws of the host country.

Motor Vehicles The use of motorized vehicles, including rental cars, motorcycles and motor scooters/mopeds is strongly discouraged. Students considering independent travel that involves rented vehicles are advised to use services that include locally licensed professional drivers.

Rude, Aggressive & Offensive Behavior AIFS will not tolerate rude, aggressive or offensive behavior, or verbal abuse towards AIFS staff, host families, other program participants or academic staff. Students who do not maintain acceptable standards of behavior may be removed from AIFS accommodations or removed from the program without refund.

Independent Travel Students traveling outside of the program location must inform their Resident Director of their travel plans.

Housing Regulations Students must conform with the dormitory and apartment regulations or the customs of the homestay family. Unmarried couples may not live together in AIFS accommodations. In addition, some families and residences will not accept married couples. Married couples should plan to provide their own accommodations. They will receive a rebate. Students who decide to move out of AIFS housing after the program has started receive no refund.

AIFS reserves the right to communicate with a student's home institution and/ or parents on matters related to student behavior, health, safety or academic performance.

TRAVEL AND FINANCIAL INFORMATION

INDEPENDENT TRAVEL

Housing on campus is not provided outside the actual program dates and students opting to travel independently before or after the program must make their own accommodation arrangements during these periods. However, housing is provided on campus for those not participating in optional weekend excursions that operate during the academic program. AIFS residences/offices do not have storage facilities for luggage during independent travel times. Your AIFS Protection Plus insurance plan covers you for up to one month during your period of independent travel after the program.

OPTIONAL EXCURSIONS

For those who prefer a prearranged itinerary during independent travel time, AIFS organizes inexpensive study excursions. Some campuses also offer optional weekend excursions. The cost of these excursions is not included in January Term school fees. The deadline for optional excursion enrollment is October 15, regardless of the date of application. If you apply late and are on a wait list, you will not be able to enroll in optional excursions after October 15 unless AIFS can confirm availability.

AIFS excursions allow free time for individual sightseeing and organized visits to points of interest by bus, train or air. A multilingual tour manager accompanies each group. Details for optional study excursions appear in each chapter. Optional excursions are subject to a minimum enrollment of 10 unless otherwise stated in the program chapter. If not achieved, AIFS reserves the right to cancel the tour. Once paid for in the U.S. the fee for optional excursions is non-refundable unless AIFS cancels the excursion.

YOUR CONTRACT WITH AIFS

1. Terms and conditions Dates, prices and program descriptions in this brochure constitute a part of the contract between AIFS and the participant. Your final itinerary provided prior to departure constitutes the actual program to be provided by AIFS.

2. International flights For international travel, airline liability for passenger baggage is usually limited. Passengers should request complete terms governing airline liability limitations for their journey upon receipt of final itinerary and/or check-in. It is the responsibility of the passenger to file claims for lost/damaged baggage directly with the airline(s). Equipment, routing and itinerary may be modified by the direct air carrier or by AIFS. Single plane service is not guaranteed. Alternative aircraft of any carrier may be substituted at any time, and aircraft may make additional stops. Such changes will not create a right to cancellation or refund.

3. Program fees include Comprehensive insurance/assistance package; specified travel as shown in the detailed itinerary; tuition fees and housing as specified in the itinerary; meals as specified in the program description; sightseeing and entertainment as specified; services of AIFS Resident Directors and tips.

4. Program fees do not include Optional transportation package, \$95 non-refundable application fee, passport fees or certain visa fees; transfers and travel in connection with independent travel; should you choose not to join the optional excursion(s), your independent travel obligations are not included in the program fee: (i) accommodations and meals during any independent travel period, including (ii) overnight accommodations and (iii) transfer to the airport prior to departure when a period of independent travel precedes the return flight; meals not listed in the program description; special beverages with meals; laundry; excess baggage charges (check with each airline for rules); textbooks; overnight and weekend optional excursions while at the university; overnight accommodations, meals and additional domestic transportation expenses in the U.S. due to rescheduled or delayed flights (sometimes paid by the airline); transportation from student's home to point of international departure and back.

5. Payment schedule Upon application, participants must send a payment of \$395 (\$95 application fee and \$300 deposit) by check or credit card (American Express, Visa or MasterCard) payable to the American Institute For Foreign Study. AIFS fees can be paid online by credit card. Visit www.aifsabroad.com for details. The \$395 fee is non-refundable. Upon acceptance, you will be billed for the balance of the program fee

due November 15 (October 15 for Berlin, Dublin, Hyderabad and Galápagos programs). The optional excursions are due by the final payment deadline of each program. Any participant whose check is returned for any reason will be assessed a charge of \$35.

6. AIFS does not require a damage deposit. Students will be responsible for payment of any damages, campus related charges or other charges incurred in student or family residences while on the program and will be invoiced accordingly. Academic transcripts will be withheld until all fees are paid.

7. AIFS Study Abroad Refund Policy The right to refunds is limited. All withdrawals must be in writing either by mail to AIFS Study Abroad, January Term Programs, American Institute For Foreign Study, 1 High Ridge Park, Stamford, CT 06905 or by fax to (203) 399-5597.

Refunds prior to the start of the program Using the postmark or fax date of a student's withdrawal letter as the official withdrawal date, the following applies:

Students who do not notify AIFS in writing of their intent to withdraw before the payment deadline are responsible for all program fees.

In addition :

- » If AIFS cancels a program, participants will be notified within 7 days and a full refund or, at the participant's option, credit toward another program will be made within 14 days of cancellation. AIFS will not cancel a program less than 10 days before scheduled departure unless circumstances exist which make it impossible for it to continue.
- » In the unlikely event that the U.S. State Department issues a travel warning before the program starts which advises U.S. citizens not to travel to the program site, AIFS will refund all fees paid minus the non-refundable deposit and application fee of \$395 and \$1,000.
- » If a program undergoes major changes and participants elect in writing to withdraw from the program, a full refund of all payments except the nonrefundable deposit and application fee of \$395 will be processed within 14 days of the cancellation. Major changes mean significant changes in program dates or destination cities. Minor alterations including reversed itineraries will not result in refunds.

Refunds once a program has started Once the program has started, students who withdraw will receive no refund unless the U.S. State Department issues a travel warning advising U.S. citizens to leave the program site. In the unlikely event of this happening, AIFS would suspend the program and students would receive a pro-rata rebate of fees paid to AIFS for the portion of the program not completed less the non-refundable deposit and application fee of \$395. Students dismissed for disciplinary reasons receive no refunds of any kind and forfeit all academic credit.

There are no refunds for meals, accommodation, cultural activities/excursions, tuition or transportation missed by students for any other reasons other than those listed above once the program has started.

8. Changes in costs, program assignments, itineraries AIFS reserves the right to make changes to departure dates and cities as may be required and to reverse an itinerary route.

- » Origin and destination cities Departures are contingent upon adequate enrollment and are assigned on a first-come, first-served basis. AIFS reserves the right to reassign participants to alternate departure cities listed on program pages. AIFS will notify participants whether a requested original departure is available no later than 30 days before departure. Destination cities may be changed as long as the change affects only the order of cities visited.
- » Housing Participants will be notified of their residence upon arrival on campus. Residences may be changed during the program as required.
- » Itineraries On certain dates, especially holidays, some attractions or activities may be closed. AIFS reserves the right to substitute attractions, excursions or activities.
- » AIFS reserves the right to make alternate program arrangements, as described above, without offering a refund, and to make changes in program and flight itineraries as may be required.
- » Except for program changes made by AIFS in accordance with the preceding paragraphs, changes in departure or return cities, departure or return dates, hotels and program fees shall constitute "major changes." In the event of a major change occurring before departure, participants will be given the choice, within 14 days, of accepting such a change or of canceling and receiving a full refund. For major changes occurring during the program, participants will be given the choice of accepting or rejecting the changes and receiving a partial refund within 14 days of the return of the program. Participants must request refunds by writing to AIFS within seven days of notification of the major change. AIFS will inform participants of a major change within seven days of learning such a change, and in any case at least 10 days before scheduled departure).

9. Flight arrangements Students must indicate on the application their intention either to take an AIFS flight or to provide their own transportation to and from the program and pay the "land only" fee listed. Students changing from an AIFS flight to their own transportation prior to 75 days before departure pay a \$100 change fee; less than 75 days prior to departure students are subject to a \$250 penalty. Students who initially intended to provide their own transportation to and from the program may apply for a seat on AIFS flights subject to the following terms: 1) prior to 75 days before departure provided space is available; a \$100 change fee is charged and 2) within 75 days before departure city to another prior to 75 days before departure pay a \$100 change fee for each change; within 75 days of departure students are subject to a \$250 penalty. Students changing from addition to any application fare differential provided space is available.

Students are sent their final itinerary approximately two weeks before departure. Students on extended personal travel before the start of the program should contact the Stamford office for itinerary information.

Due to TSA regulations students wishing to travel on an AIFS flight must be sure to give their full name exactly as it appears on their passport. If students give an incomplete or incorrect name on their application, they will be responsible for any financial penalties incurred or flight tickets cancelled.

10. Financial aid

- Government loans The Department of Education Stafford Student Loan Program offers funds to students whose families show financial need. Details about this and other aid awards are available from your home institution's Financial Aid Office.
- Financial aid from the home institution Your college or university may agree to apply aid to your AIFS study program. If you plan to use your financial aid award to pay for all or part of your AIFS fees, you must: (1) Apply early at the Financial Aid Office on your campus. This will enable you to receive notification of your award and determine before the final AIFS payment deadline whether you will be financially able to participate; (2) Arrange to have documentation sent from the Financial Aid Office or lending institution to AIFS stating the amount of the award and date it will be disbursed. The AIFS Financial Aid Information Form, available from AIFS, must be completed by the financial aid officer at your institution or lending agency and returned to AIFS January Term Programs office in Stamford, CT, prior to the November 15 final payment deadline.
- » Students who have their financial aid package modified or denied after the AIFS program begins are responsible for full payment. Failure to make immediate payment to AIFS will result in being administratively withdrawn. In this case, no refund or academic credit will be granted.
- » AIFS programs may be eligible for V.A. tuition grants.
- » Students may also charge all or a part of the program cost to American Express, MasterCard, or Visa.



11. AIFS Protection Plan (Included in the program fee) provides the most comprehensive medical and program/tuition refund package available to students studying abroad. The plan is administered by Cultural Insurance Services International (CISI). CISI is the leader

in providing insurance coverage to the international education sector, currently providing insurance coverage, travel/technical/medical assistance and claim paying services to more than 150,000 international students and cultural exchange participants worldwide. It covers you for the duration of your program, plus up to one month of independent travel after the program. Students will receive an individual insurance policy describing the coverage in detail. Please check this carefully as some exclusions and limitations apply - for example pre-existing medical conditions are covered up to \$500.

Medical and baggage insurance Coverage is provided by the ACE American Insurance Company. All claims are processed on a fast track basis by CISI staff. Unlike other plans, the AIFS student plan settles claims abroad, in your host country's respective currency. This facilitates immediate entry to a hospital for treatment. Treatments must of course be documented. The Resident Director helps with administrative matters concerning claims. Each campus has a doctor and infirmary available to handle minor ailments. The Resident Director arranges for students requiring treatment for more serious illnesses and accidents to receive immediate attention from the recommended university doctor and hospital in the area.

The coverage includes the following:

- Medical expenses while abroad The insurance covers medical bills up to a maximum of \$250,000 for each medically covered illness or accident abroad for up to 52 weeks from the date of such illness or injury. Pre-existing complaints are covered up to a maximum of \$500 only. Among items covered are treatment by a physician or surgeon, nurse fees, x-rays, ambulance, therapeutic services, operations, drugs and medicines prescribed by a physician, hospital room and board (semi-private accommodations). Unlike other plans, the AIFS student plan settles claims abroad, in your host country's respective currency. This facilitates immediate entry to a hospital for treatment. Treatments must of course be documented. The Resident Director helps with administrative matters concerning claims. Each campus has a doctor and infirmary available to handle minor ailments. The Resident Director arranges for students requiring treatment for more serious illnesses and accidents to receive immediate attention from the recommended university doctor and hospital in the area.
- » Mental health coverage The insurance plan covers mental or nervous disorders up to \$2,500 for outpatient treatment or up to \$10,000 for inpatient treatment per lifetime. See Plan of Insurance brochure for further details.

- » Baggage insurance Personal effects are covered up to \$3,000 with a \$50 deductible. Electronic equipment to include laptops are covered up to \$500. Some exclusions apply. Please see the Plan of Insurance for further details
- Medical cancellation insurance If after any scheduled payment has been made, but before departure, you are prevented from embarking on your trip because of either 1) covered accidental bodily injuries, disease or covered sickness for which you are under care of a legally qualified physician or surgeon or 2) quarantine at the place of residence or epidemic in the area of travel, the plan will reimburse the insured for payments in excess of the non-refundable deposit and application fee of \$395 and any tuition, housing and flight cancellation fees up to a maximum benefit of 3,000.
- Return airfare expense If you travel on an AIFS flight, this plan will cover the cost up to a maximum of \$1,000 of your return air transportation on a regularly scheduled commercial flight (tourist class) to the original AIFS point of departure if you are unable to complete the program for any reason outlined under the Program cancellation insurance. A certificate of illness from a physician, other than a relative or member of your household, is necessary in making claims.
- Team Assist Plan The AIFS insurance program provides participants with a world-wide 24-hour emergency telephone assistance service. Multilingual help and advice may be furnished for the participant in the event of any emergency during the term of coverage. Assistance services include: Medical monitoring, prescription drug replacement/shipment, emergency message transmittals, coverage verification/payment assistance for medical expenses. Travel assistance services include: Obtaining emergency cash, traveler check replacement, lost/ delayed luggage tracking, replacement of lost or stolen airline ticket, credit card/ passport/important document replacement.

In addition your plan provides for:

- » Emergency Medical Evacuation/Repatriation The Company shall pay benefits for Covered Expenses incurred up to \$250,000, if any Injury or covered Illness commencing during the Period of Coverage results in the Medically Necessary Emergency Medical Evacuation or Repatriation of the Insured Person. The decision for an Emergency Medical Evacuation or Repatriation must be ordered by the Assistance Company in consultation with the Insured Person's local attending Physician.
- » **Return of Mortal Remains or Cremation** The Company will pay the reasonable Covered Expenses incurred up to \$250,000 to return the Insured Person's remains to his/her then current Home Country, if he or she dies.

- » Trip Delay Benefit The Company will pay covered expenses of up to \$1,000 limited to \$250 per day if a student's trip is delayed for more than 12 hours. (Covered reasons are outlined in the brochure.)
- Security Evacuation Benefit The Company shall pay benefits up to \$100,000 in the event of specified occurrences such as political unrest and physical threats. To view the policy details and download a brochure go to www.culturalinsurance.com/cisi_forms.asp.

12. Responsibility AIFS is responsible for making all program arrangements including housing. AIFS is also responsible for making flight arrangements for students who select this option. A program begins with the departure of the international flight and ends upon completion of the return flight to the U.S.

AIFS cannot be responsible for events beyond its control such as (without limitation) acts of God, war, incidents of politically motivated violence, strikes or government restrictions. Nor, in the absence of its own negligence, can AIFS be responsible for personal injury or property damages caused by persons not controlled by it, such as (without limitation) airlines, bus companies, railway, hotels, universities and persons engaging in acts of politically motivated violence.

The actual itinerary may be reversed or vary slightly from those in this brochure. The final itinerary sent constitutes the program to be provided by the Institute. The agreement with AIFS cannot be modified or interpreted except in writing by the AIFS Stamford office. No verbal modification or interpretation shall have any validity.

13. Visas Travelers not allowed to board at an airport because they do not have the correct or sufficient travel documents must assume all consequences. Failure to meet deadlines or obtain a visa does not constitute grounds for deviation from the standard refund policy.

Passports are required of everyone traveling outside the U.S. on AIFS programs. Non-U.S. citizens may be required to obtain visas to enter certain countries. For more information, check with the Washington, DC embassy for each country you will visit. Non-U.S. citizens are responsible for securing visas needed and must allow several weeks—or months—for this process.

14. Immunizations Students should contact their doctor or Board of Health to see if immunizations are needed.

FLIGHT PACKAGE FEES BY DEPARTURE CITY

For your convenience, AIFS will arrange your round-trip airfare including all fuel surcharges, taxes and fees, meet you at the arrival airport(s) and provide transportation to and from the program site on scheduled arrival and departure dates.
