HIGHLIGHTS

Study international development in Senegal, an inviting French-speaking country seen as a bridge between Africa and the West. Broaden your experience through an internship or research project and explore vital issues related to the environment, globalization, public health, and social justice.

Housing & Meals

Live with a host family during both the classroom phase and the internship/research phase.

A homestay is an integral component of the learning experience and often a highlight for participants. Your family provides not only housing and most meals, but is also an important connection to Senegalese culture.

Excursions

Although excursions change from semester to semester, you can expect to visit a variety of sites that may include local markets and places of historical significance. In addition, as part of your classes, site visits will take you to development agencies and other areas of interest around Dakar. Finally, a longer excursion to the Toubacouta region will introduce you to life in the more rural areas of Senegal.

Learning Outcomes

- Foster an understanding of the global context through classroom and experiential learning
- Cultivate awareness and appreciation for development issues through engagement with diverse communities
- · Translate insights gained into enriched perspectives on concepts of social justice and sustainable development
- Strengthen communication skills through acquisition of local languages and cultural awareness
- Gain cross-cultural competencies through extended engagement at a local grassroots organization





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COURSEWORK

Delve into hands-on learning in Senegal. Spend seven weeks engaged in coursework in Dakar, followed by six weeks working as an intern or conducting a research project. The semester wraps up with a one-week capstone seminar.

Intensive Language Pre-Session

An optional four-credit intensive French language course is offered approximately one month prior to the start of each semester.

INTERNSHIPS

An internship with a development agency provides an unparalleled opportunity to understand the local community and the host agency's approach to development. See firsthand how the theory learned during the classroom phase plays out in reality.

RESEARCH

Students may select a research project at a development agency rather than an internship. Topics are designed in consultation with the agency and finalized after your arrival.

FINANCIAL PLANNING
