Explore



The city of Valencia was founded in 138 B.C. by the Roman Consul, Decimus Junius Brutus.

The city gracefully mixes new and old, with modern public services, business establishments and leisure attractions, all moving against a backdrop of historically important civic and religious buildings, monuments and museums.

Valencia is the third largest city in Spain, and has a population of about 800,000. It is a coastal city on the Mediterranean, and is surrounded by immense beaches. Because the regional climate is so mild (yearly average temperature 77°F), it is quite pleasant to visit the coast during the greater part of the year.

By air, rail, or boat, it is easy to travel from Valencia as it is well located with respect to other important cities in Spain, as well as continental Europe.

UVA in Valencia

The University of Virginia in Valencia Program has been serving the academic community since 1983.

From its inception, the program has provided an enriching and comprehensive experience for the student interested in becoming well-versed in Spanish and Latin American culture, literature, art and language. Students are welcome to focus on one of our "tracks" if they wish. Each track provides the same level of cultural competency and in-depth learning.

LANGUAGE AND CULTURE offers a rich complement of courses ranging from Spanish language skills, to the arts, culture and civilization, history, and literature.

BUSINESS SPANISH includes site visits and symposia to provide a showcase of European, Spanish and specifically, Valencian business and industry. Business and Econ classes are taught in Spanish.

SOCIAL SCIENCES includes courses such as Politics of Western Europe, Politics of Latin America, and Introduction to Social Psychology, taught in English.

ENGINEERING is taught by faculty at the Universidad Politécnica de Valencia in English, with the benefit of very small class size, which fosters collaboration and a more personalized learning experience. Students are required to additionally take at least one Spanish language course.

PRE-HEALTH is taught in English and includes Pre-Health requirements tailored for Pre-Med and Science major students. Students are required to additionally take at least one Spanish language course.

GLOBAL HEALTH teaches Comparative Health Care Systems as well as Spanish Language and Medical Spanish. There are numerous experiential visits to a variety of local hospitals and healthcare facilities.

SPORTS, LANGUAGE AND CULTURE offers student athletes the opportunity to participate in an abroad experience while maintaining their training regimen at facilities in Valencia. Coursework includes Spanish Culture and Civilization and Spanish Language classes.





Student Life

Homestays

- · Students live with host families in singles or doubles.
- · Homestays help students gain an understanding of the culture and customs of Valencia.
- Students increase their Spanish language skills through everyday interactions with their hosts.
- · Students are provided three meals a day and have their laundry done once a week.

Language Partners

- Attend a meet and greet with local students who want to help you with your Spanish and improve their English.
- Enjoy coordinated activities with Spanish peers and arrange times to meet on your own for language practice.

Activities

- Enjoy guided visits to the heart of Valencia, the City of Arts and Sciences and Oceanographic Park, the Bioparc, and museums.
- Learn to cook Spanish food, paint and use a Spanish fan, sail on the Mediterranean or dance flamenco.
- · Attend movies, concerts, soccer games, bull fights, parades and celebrations.

Trips

- Thematic field trips to cities around Valencia including Bocairent, Calpe, Cullera, Morella, Peñíscola, and Xàtiva.
- · Optional fall-break trip walking on the Camino de Santiago.

The cost of this excursion is around €600, which includes transportation, lodging and meals.

SPORTS, LANGUAGE, & CULTURE

This program is designed to give student athletes and those interested in sport the opportunity to experience study abroad without sacrificing their training commitments. Participants will be able to engage in a strength and conditioning training with access to sports facilities specific to their sport. Students on this program will visit the Mestalla Soccer Stadium, the Valencia bullring and bullfighting museum, have a flamenco workshop, attend a flamenco performance, and have a Spanish cooking class.

Admission

The following requirements are necessary for enrollment in the program:

- 1. Be registered or accepted at a college or university as a full-time student.
- 2. Be a student in good disciplinary and academic standing.
- 3. Minimum 2.5 overall GPA.

Financial

Prices include:

- 1. Tuition: 12–15 credits per semester. Six credits each summer session.
- 2. Program fees: Orientation, on-site student support services including full time staff, insurance, 24/7 emergency assistance, faculty advisor and tutoring, gym membership and bus/Metro pass.
- 3. Trips: Two 1-day trips per summer term, three per semester.
- 4. Pre-departure Services: UVA staff available to students and their families to answer questions about all aspects of the program. Assistance with student visas. Pre-departure handbooks.
- 5. Housing in Homestay: Students are placed in either singles or doubles according to availability.
 - · Summer Combo prices include room & board between sessions.
 - Year prices do not include room & board between semesters. Accommodations with host families during this time must be arranged with program administration prior to the end of the fall semester.
- 6. Full Board: Three meals a day in the home. With advanced notice, bagged lunches are provided.
- 7. Laundry: Host will wash clothes every 5–7 days. Use of household sheets and towels.
- 8. Official University of Virginia Transcript.

Optional Group flight from JFK Airport for an additional fee. Students may opt to arrange their own travel.
