


Choose an organization that has:



INTERNATIONAL PROGRAM COST REDUCTION CONSIDERATIONS

AIR

- Be flexible on the days of the week you can travel. This will assist with both airline and accommodation availability. Midweek travel (Monday-Thursday) is generally less expensive than weekend travel (Friday-Sunday).
- Limit the number of countries your course will visit. Significant savings can be achieved by reducing air, ground and water transportation.
- Be flexible on what airline you will use and the number of connections. Airfare is one of the most significant expenses on international courses, and the best place to find savings if you are flexible.
- Choose major cities to fly into and out of. Generally there is more competition in and out of the major cities, thus a better chance at a lower negotiated group rate.
- If visiting more than one country, for instance England and France, flexibility on the order you visit the countries may help to avoid conferences or other events that may drive up prices during the time period.

ACCOMMODATIONS

- Stay at an accommodation off the beaten path away from the city center, or just outside of the city. Accommodations should still be easily accessible to city center by public transportation or walking. A fifteen to twenty minute walk is not unreasonable for students and using public transportation allows more opportunities for interaction.
- Utilizing an overnight train/ferry or triple/quad bedding (where available) saves on accommodation costs.
- Where proper classroom space is not necessary, for instance summarizing daily activities or a brief discussion on your course subject, consider utilizing accommodation lobbies, bars, restaurants, outdoor space, etc. wherever possible in lieu of traditional classroom/conference space to avoid booking fees.

MEALS

- Group set meals (pre-ordered menus) are more expensive than giving money to students for meals to dine out on their own. Having a Faculty Director use group funds to take out mini groups of 5-6 students is cost effective and provides quality student/faculty interaction than meals with the entire group. Breakfast normally is included in your accommodation cost.
- If you have contacts in the cities you're visiting, it is worth asking them to host a dinner. Some organizations offer to do this at a nominal fee, some do it free of charge. It provides a great cultural exchange for the students.

TRANSFERS / GUIDES

- Weigh the savings of using public transportation vs. the convenience of private transfers.
- If you are arriving into a city on an early morning flight or train, your hotel rooms will most likely not be ready. If a city tour is part of your course requirements, including it as part of your private coach transfer en route to the hotel will save the additional cost of hiring a coach for the tour and will also familiarize the students with the city.
- Consider audio guides through a handheld device where available.
- When visiting sites that require 1+ hours of travel, meet a local guide at the destination rather than have one travel with the group.
- Where available, use dedicated museum/site guides located at the venue instead of a general licensed tourist guide.
- Flexibility on what theatre or music performance will be included, and on what date, allows for better seats and many times a better discount.
- In lieu of a private tour, consider a public hop-on/off bus ticket for a city familiarization tour, or a public boat tour where appropriate (Copenhagen and London are examples where this is possible).

Flexibility = savings in almost every aspect of every course.




